### **PIC upgrades keep the facility competitive**

The Plymouth Ice Center has long been a leading arena in the region, hosting half a million people each year. However, as Plymouth looks towards the future of PIC, critical upgrades are required.

A range of improvements begin this year, totaling an investment of roughly \$2.2 million. PIC is an enterprise fund for the city, which means that the facility strives to operate with a net profit.

Investing in facility upgrades will help keep PIC competitive and operating in the black.

#### Rink Resize

A major component of the project is to reconfigure the main rink from Olympic to professional size. Olympic size rinks were popular at the time of PIC's construction, and are about 15 feet wider than professional size ice sheets.

### **Market value notices**

Market value notices for Plymouth properties will hit mailboxes toward the end of March. The notices list the value of the property and its classification for taxes payable in 2017. Property values affect how much tax residents pay each year. Residents with questions should call 763-509-5350. Homeowners with concerns about valuations can dispute their value at the Hennepin County Open Book Meeting 4:30-7 p.m. Wednesday, April 19 at Plymouth City Hall, 3400 Plymouth Blvd. At the meeting, residents will work one-on-one with a representative to resolve value disputes. The updated process, which debuted last year, is easier for residents and streamlines property value adjustments.

Whether it's a new house, old home or an emergency repair, the City of Plymouth and the Plymouth Housing and Redevelopment Authority offer a number of programs that can help residents meet their housing goals. To learn more, visit plymouthmn.gov/hra or call 763-509-5410.

#### First-time Homebuyer Loans

The HRA offers zero-interest deferred loans to help qualified buyers offset down payment and closing costs. The program provides assistance on a sliding scale based on family size and income. Applicants must meet income limits, attend homebuyer education sessions, finance the home through a participating lender and be a first-time homebuyer or have not owned a home in the last three years. Visit plymouthmn.gov/firsthome for details.

#### Architectural Design Service

The HRA offers a two-hour architectural consultation for those interested in an addition or expansion of their living space. To be eligible, applicants must be owner-occupants of a residential property in Plymouth. Consultations are available for homes 30 years old or older. The HRA offers a list of approved architects from which homeowners may choose. Homeowners will be reimbursed for one consultation through the program.

hospital, emergency, home and specialist environments. Smiths products are used during critical and intensive care, surgery, post-operative care during recovery and in-home infusion therapies.

The international company employs about 7,500 people worldwide. Last year, Smiths opened its new global headquarters in Plymouth.

#### Home Rehabilitation Loans

Zero-interest loans are available for qualifying applicants in moderate- to low-income households. The rehabilitation loan program offers deferred, no-interest loans of up to \$30,000 to help residents make qualifying safety and energy efficiency upgrades. These may include new roofing, siding, windows, electrical, plumbing, heating and insulation.

#### **Emergency Repair Grants**

The HRA has grants available for residents ages 55 and older who wish to make emergency repairs to their homes. Those who meet income eligibility may qualify for a grant of up to \$5,000 to repair or replace water heaters, furnaces, doors, locks, plumbing and other urgent repairs.

#### Senior Rental Housing

The HRA also owns and operates two senior apartment buildings, both of which are currently accepting applications from potential residents. Plymouth Towne Square and Vicksburg Crossing offer residents 55 and older quality, independent living near the Plymouth City Center. The wider rinks have since gone out of style and youth hockey groups, which are PIC's largest users, find that Olympic rinks aren't conducive to teaching the sport. Converting to a professional size sheet is expected to increase rink rental demand and allow more organizations to utilize PIC.

#### Energy Efficiency

The center's refrigeration system will be transformed from utilizing R22 Freon to an ammonia-based coolant.

The current coolant is being phased out of production due to its potential for environmental harm if leaks occur. An ammonia system not only significantly reduces environmental risk, but also boosts energy efficiency.

The floor of the main rink, which is currently sand, will be rebuilt as concrete. The concrete floor will resolve uneven cooling problems and further reduce energy costs. Combined, the upgrades are expected to save roughly 30 percent in energy costs.

#### Finding Funding

To help offset the \$2.2 million cost of the upgrades, Wayzata Youth Hockey Association has contributed \$150,000 and the city received a \$100,000 James Metzen Mighty Ducks Ice Arena Grant from the state. The energy cost savings and increased rental capabilities are projected

to achieve project cost payback within a decade. Work is set to begin in May, after scheduled 2017 tournaments, and is expected to be completed in October.

#### National Notability

The upgrades come at a good time – the arena will soon be in the national spotlight. PIC was selected to host the 2017 USA Hockey Sled Classic (presented by the NHL) and the 2018 USA Hockey National High School Tournament.

These major tournaments will bring the best high school hockey players, sled hockey teams and fans from across the nation to Plymouth. The tournaments also promise to be a boon to the local economy. Tournament-goers are expected to spend significant dollars on lodging, food, transportation, supplies, gear and entertainment.

### Water main flushing begins in April

The city will flush water mains on the following schedule:

- April 10-12: Industrial areas, both sides of Interstate 494, south of Highway 55
- April 10-26: Residential areas west of I-494, except areas along both sides of County Road 47 west of I-494
- May 1-16: Residential areas east of I-494, and areas along both sides of County Road 47 west of I-494

Water may be discolored throughout this time, but it is more likely on the day your area is flushed.

Please avoid doing laundry on that day. If water appears to be discolored, let an outdoor water faucet run until the water is clear.
