Plan them & run them!

On NIGHT TO UNITE, firefighters will make random visits parties. They'll ask one family at each party if they can test their smoke detectors. If the detectors work, they'll award the family with a NIGHT TO UNITE

t-shirt, right on the spot! If the detectors are not working, firefighters will provide the family with new batteries and/or new detectors.

Also on NIGHT TO UNITE, police officers will make random visits to parties.



They'll ask one family per party if they can test the lock on their garage service door. If the door is secured, they'll award the family with a NIGHT TO UNITE t-shirt. If the door is not secured, they'll provide

information on how to secure this door.

Minnesota's Night to Unite

Every year, the first Tuesday in August is a chance for neighbors to turn on their lights, lock their doors, come together, and give crime and drugs a going away party. Neighborhood Watch Program

Find out how you can create a partnership between police and individual neighborhoods to help neighbors come together to watch out for each other, report suspicious activity to the police, and make their community safer. For information on starting a Neighborhood Watch, call 763-509-5198.

E-mail Crime Alert Network and Interactive Crime Map (www.plymouthmn.gov)

There are times when providing information to the community immediately is important. The Plymouth Police and Fire Department's E-mail Network is an effective way a quick and efficient way to do so. Alerts may be used to notify you of a crime pattern or trend, a missing person or criminal suspect, or a special program opportunity that is available to you. If a natural or other disaster would impact Plymouth, we will also use the E-mail Network to provide you with briefings on the situation.

File of Life

The File of Life program is a card that contains important personal medical information that is easily accessible by police and ambulance personnel in the event of a medical emergency. Call 763-509-5147 to request free File of Life cards.

Home and Business Premise Security Surveys

A Plymouth police officer will come out to your home or business, meet with you to discuss your safety concerns and security needs, and give you crime prevention recommendations customized to your

home or business. Call 763-509-5147 to schedule an appointment.

Child Passenger Safety Program CHAD Program (Children Have an Identity)

Children usually do not carry identity information with them when they ride their bikes, skateboards, or rollerblades in the community. A CHAD sticker placed on the inside of the helmet provides police, fire, and EMS critical emergency

Fire and Police Station Tours

The Plymouth Fire and Police Departments provides tour for youth and community groups. To schedule a fire

Bike Helmet Program

Protect your loved ones as they have fun in the sun! New helmets are sold at Plymouth Fire Station III (3300 Dunkirk Ln.) The first and third Thursdays of the month, May-August from 6-8 p.m. Bike helmets are available for \$10, \$12 and multi-sport helmets are available for \$15, sizes youth to adult. Call 763-509-5198 for more information.

Smokebuster's Home Fire Safety Program for Families and Seniors Program

Upon request firefighters will make home visits to help residents test their smoke detectors, replace batteries, discuss 9-1-1 and develop a home fire escape plan. Smokebusters is free of charge. To schedule a visit, call the Plymouth Fire Department at 763-509-5198.

Home Alone Workshops

Many children let themselves in or out of empty houses and supervise themselves for an hour or more each day. Fire and Police sponsor Home Alone workshops throughout the year, for families with children in the Wayzata and Robbinsdale School Districts. The workshops helped parents evaluate if their child is ready to be home alone, prepare their homes so that they are safe and ready for a stay-at-home child, and create house rules to keep families safe and working together.

Self Defense Classes

The self defense classes are geared towards females and address many traditional safety concerns through an open discussion and easy, hands-on defensive tactics techniques taught by Plymouth Police Officers. The class is appropriate for ages 13 and up. Bring your mother, sister, friends, and neighbors and learn how to stay safe. Check for class listings through Plymouth Parks and Recreation Department.

iWATCH

iWATCH Plymouth is a community awareness program created to educate the public about behaviors and activities that may have a connection to terrorism. The goal of iWATCH is to help Plymouth stay safe from terrorist activities. It is an extension of the Neighborhood Watch program and the Department of Homeland Security's "See Something, Say Something" message.
