Child Passenger Safety Program

CHAD program

Children usually do not carry identity information with them when they ride their bikes, skateboards, or rollerblades. A CHAD sticker placed on the inside of the helmet provides police, fire, and EMS critical contact information in the case of an emergency. Call 763-509-5198 more information.

Bike Helmet Program

Protect your loved ones as they have fun in the sun! Helmets are sold at Plymouth Fire Station III (3300 Dunkirk Lane) the 1^{st} and 3^{rd} Thursdays of the month, May-August, from 6-8 p.m. Bike helmets start at \$10; multi-sport helmets are \$15. Home Alone Workshops

Many children are home alone for an hour or more each day. The Police and Fire Departments sponsor Home Alone workshops throughout the year, for families with children in the Wayzata and Robbinsdale School Districts. The workshops help parents evaluate if their child is ready to be home alone, prepare their homes so that they are safe and ready for a stay-at-home child, and create house rules to keep families safe and working together.

Free FBI Child ID App

The FBI Child ID app allows parents and caregivers to electronically store photos and vital information about



children so it's right at hand if you need it. Tips on keeping children safe, as well as guidance on what to do in the first crucial hours after a child goes missing, are also included on the app. Currently, the app is only available for iPhones and can only be downloaded from iTunes. The FBI plans to expand this tool to other types of mobile devices and will be adding new features in the near future. (www.fbi.gov)

Crime Stoppers

Crime Stoppers of Minnesota is a *separate and independent organization from law enforcement* for the purpose of gathering information that may not otherwise be available to police, but can help solve crimes. If you have information about a crime, please contact Crime Stoppers. No matter how small or insignificant the information may seem, it may be the one piece of the puzzle that police need to solve a crime. If the tip leads to the arrest and prosecution of the suspect, then you are eligible to receive a cash reward <u>up to \$1,000</u>. Crime Stoppers is *completely anonymous*, so no one can know who submitted the tip, not even police.

How to Report Suspicious Activity

Please report suspicious activity *immediately* by calling **9-1-1**. When calling, remember to give as much information as possible, including: a description of the activity and why the behavior is suspicious, where the activity is occurring, a description of the suspects and/or vehicle, and a direction of travel, if suspects left.

File of Life

What if there is a medical emergency and no one is around to let emergency personnel know what your medical history is, what your medications or allergies are, or who to contact? The File of Life program is a way to keep important medical information easily accessible to police and ambulance personnel in the event of a medical emergency. Home and Business Security Surveys

Self Defense for Females


